For Alan Pumford and Mike Stelter, it is more than that. Each of them shares a father-son relationship with his caddy. Alan Pumford recently captured the Saginaw County District Open and Senior titles at Apple Mountain. It was his first title in both divisions, and he became only the second player to win both titles in the same year.

Mike Humphrey first captured that honor in 1998.

On Pumford's bag for the entire

weekend was his son, Nick Pumford.

Mike Stelter, on the other hand, finished second in the Senior Tournament, and on Sunday he finished the final round of the Open Tournament with his father Ron on his bag. Stelter finished tied for second with Micah Skidmore.

The two caddies brought a lot of

experience with them, as Ron Stelter has 10 District titles to his name and Nick Pumford has two. Nick is also assistant coach of the Georgia State University golf team.

"He really helped me out there," Alan Pumford said of his son.
"Nick kept telling me to commit to the shot. He teaches that to his kids

# Indian River fun for all abilities

Golf trips are fun to plan. It's always nice to know what courses to include with your favorites on your yearly trips.

When planning a golf trip, I like to add a newer course that I've heard about and want to experience.

As I made a trip up north, I found a course that fits the bill. The Indian River Golf Club is located in a dense wooded area just minutes off I-75 on Exit 310.

The first hole is a 300-yard parfour with a severe dogleg left and an uphill green. Those are just a couple of the many interesting characteristics of the course.

Nos. 8 and 16 stood out, as a small body of water fronts both greens for a very nice panoramic view.

The No. 9 par-3 is 142 yards from the tips. The downhill green is flanked by a cemetery on the right,

with the clubhouse visible atop the hill to the right of the green.

Their large practice area is reached by driving through the road that separates the course from the cemetery.

Indian River has tee boxes for all abilities. The blue tees are 6,887; the white tees 6,158; the gold tees 5,405; and the red tees 5,175.

The course also boasts a full-service restaurant, with a chance to order food and beverages before you reach the ninth tee from the half-way house.





Raymond's previous high series was an 836, rolled in his hometown of Gaylord.

The skilled right-hander bowled at Saginaw Valley State University for one year before transferring to McKendree University, near St. Louis, Mo.

He coached the girls team there for one year and then competed as a member of with the men's college team for two more seasons.

For all three years he bowled with a college squad, Raymond made the All-American team.

"I've been debating on going back to school to finish my degree," Raymond said. "But the next four weekends, I am trying Central Region PBA regionals. They have eightgame qualifiers with the top 16 advancing to match play."

A win in any of the regionals counts as a PBA championship and an automatic berth in the PBA Champions of Champions tournament

"Last year I was the rookie of the year for the Central region," Raymond said. "I didn't win any but I had a couple of second places."

Raymond also plans on bowling in the World Series of Bowling that kicks off the PBA tour in November.

"I some success in a couple of tournaments last year," he said. "I hope to use that as a learning expe-

rience and move on from there.

"I also have a couple ball reps in my corner this year," he added. "That's very important. Everyone out there (on the tour) can roll the ball with consistency."

Raymond said ball reps are important as they can get the right ball in your hands for the conditions out there on the tour.

"Usually I feel that I am on the other end of the stick," Raymond said. "There's been times I have felt that I should have gotten a few more.

"Sometimes you win," said Raymond about getting breaks or not. "Sometimes you don't." ◆

But the first shot didn't cooperate. A slice put the ball in the woods before the opening to the green. I was able to find the ball and tried punching it out.

It was good until the final five feet, when it caught a branch and then nestled behind a small pine tree. Another punch-out, and I still couldn't see the green.

Before I knew it, I was sitting with an eight after the first hole.

After that first hole, I had three fives, two fours and a six to finish out the back nine.

While a slice got me on the first hole, it was a duck hook that caught me when I started the front nine.

I hit the tree on the par-five and went straight down into the creek. Another eight ensued.

But at that point, I still had a chance to catch up — there were several holes that I felt were within my reach of getting a par.

Then bad luck hit. It was the direct result of some poor shots that sent my ball behind trees where I needed to punch out to see the green.

I finished with a 95 that day — nine shots off the pace for the chance to play in the district.

Looking back at my round, the two par-5s on which that I took a snowman (eight) took a lot of wind out my sails.

For the other 16 holes, I averaged a shade under five strokes per hole. So my theory did work, in a way.

## Playing my own district

I invited four friends and my son Ryan to play in a one-day, mini-district tournament at Apple Mountain.

We teed off just after the Saginaw County District on their second day of the tournament.

My goal was to see how well I could

hit the ball under the same conditions, with the same pin placements and tee boxes.

Apple Mountain was a tough test for all the Saginaw County District golfers, as only three players were under par for any one round in the tournament. The pin placements weren't in any easy locations.

I finished with a 95 that day (that seems to be my average) and would have done better than a couple of other golfers.

There again, I left several strokes out there that could have lowered my score.

I even finished in the middle of the pack of our little outing.

I keep working on my game and will keep trying to qualify for the districts.

I still have a long way to go, and the odds may not be as favorable as they

were heading into this year.

But that will just make qualifying that much sweeter. ♦

at Georgia State. I never really wavered on any of the shots until No. 17 (on the last day)."

Pumford was coasting along after sinking a birdie putt on No. 15. A bogey on 16 cut into his lead, leading up to his errant shot on 17.

"I was 212 out and the wind had picked up. I decided on the four-iron, but I really wasn't comfortable with it," he said.

"I never had confidence when I went to hit that shot, and it showed. I didn't hit it well and it landed in the water."

On No. 18, his drive landed in the sand trap on the right side of the fairway, some 170-plus yards out.

Alan Pumford's triple-bogey on No. 17 cut his lead down to one . . . or was it?

The walking scoreboards showed just that.

"We could see what was happening ahead of us, and knew we needed a birdie to win," said Nick Pumford, who didn't realize the scoreboards were wrong at the time.

"I went for it right then," Alan Pumford said.

"Win or lose, right there. I hit it over the water and the sand right onto the green."

Two putts later and Pumford had a birdie and a two-stroke win.

"That was just a great shot he made back there," Nick Pumford said of his father. "Thinking that we needed a birdie to win . . . and making the shot was clutch.

"It was horrible carrying his bag," Nick Pumford laughed. "I think I was more nervous than he was. I wanted him to do so well. He has always been behind me and my efforts into the game.

"I couldn't hit the shots for him," he added. "It is absolutely a great feeling. It brings tears to my eyes."

Pumford's two titles gave him a sweet feeling of a goal finally accomplished.

"It's something that I have been looking for a long time," he said. "It's an indescribable feeling. Having (my son) Nick here made it all that much better."

Mike Stelter finished tied for second in the Open Division, but he gives a lot of the credit to his father, Ron.

"If he wasn't there I wouldn't have shot a 72 — not even close," Stelter said. "He knows my game and he really helped me out with my putting.

"I tell everyone that we have 11 District titles between us," he added, laughing. "Of course, (my fa-

ther) has 10 of them himself. He has the experience coming down to the final round. We have such a great relationship together. It was fun having him there."

Ron Stelter competed in the Senior Tournament on the first two days.

On the final day, he caddied for his son.

"He caddied for me when I was going strong," Ron Stelter said. "So this was my turn. We read the greens the same way, so that part is easy. I was just making sure his putter was square to the line."

While his son Mike didn't win any titles that weekend, Ron Stelter had high praise for the 2011 champion Alan Pumford.

"No one can say he's the best player never to win the District," he said. "Now he has two of them." ◆

"We worked with Chad (Maxim, Head Golf Professional at Apple Mountain), and told him we could get the work done if we had two vacant tee times ahead of the District," Farah said.

"We felt that it was important the District had fresh greens and cut holes prior to the start of their play," he added.

"We didn't want someone to come back and say they missed a putt because of a divot or bad cup."



# Enjoy your golf game; Tee It Forward

By its very nature, golf is a tough game. Now, The PGA of America and the United States Golf Association (USGA) are partnering in an effort to make it not necessarily easier but more enjoyable to play this game we all love.

When golfing at a new course, I like to be challenged. I go to the tips and try to play where the pros tee off. When playing familiar courses, I play from the white tees. But what about the golds? Or even the reds?

The USGA has just begun a campaign to help people answer that very question. The Tee It Forward program encourages golfers to play a course at a length that is aligned with their average driving distance. Golfers can speed up play by choosing tees that provide the greatest playability and enjoyment. They can use a simple chart to find the ideal tees.

The program is being promoted from July 5 - July 17.

A Tee It Forward press release explains that Barney Adams, the founder of Adams Golf, came up with the original idea. By playing from forward tees, amateur golfers have the chance to play the course at the same relative distance as a touring professional would over 18 holes. By giving every golfer the opportunity to play from a distancesthat is properly aligned with his or her ability, Tee it Forward levels the playing field.

With many more golfers hitting approach shots with six- and seven-irons instead of hybrids and long irons, their chances for enjoyment increase. Also, playing from

forward tees should result in fewer overall shots, shorter distance traveled on each hole, and, potentially, fewer lost balls.

"The passion that golfers have for our game has the potential to be enhanced by the Tee It Forward initiative," said Jim Hyler, president of the United States Golf Association. "This is an innovation that we think will appeal to golfers of all skill levels because it gives them a new challenge that better aligns with their abilities. We hope that Tee It Forward will be embraced by players and golf facilities across the country."

Tee It Forward is not necessarily about creating a new set of tees, since many facilities already have multiple tees in use every day. It is about changing the mindset of golfers in a positive way—encouraging people to consider setting aside playing from 6,500–6,700 yards and moving up to a length of 6,000–6,200 yards or moving from 6,000–6,200 yards to 5,700–5,800 yards (see chart).

The 6,700-yard course that many amateur golfers play today is proportionally equivalent to a PGA Tour player competing on a course

measuring 8,100 yards—and that's 700 yards or longer than a typical PGA Tour layout.

I tried that while playing Indian River on Father's Day. I am not a long ball hitter by any means. I started out playing from the tips (3,250 yards on the front nine). By the time I got to No. 8, I had decided to Tee It Forward.

My sons, Ryan and Joey, and my playing partner and Strikes n' Strokes Webmaster Yudha Pratama, teed off from the tips on No. 10. I was sitting in the cart, and when they came down, I took off.

I could hear them chortling "Where do you think you're going?" from behind our cart.

I passed the white tees. The wise-cracks from the peanut gallery just kept coming.

When I got up to the gold tees, which were just behind the reds on No. 10, I had knocked 700 yards off my distance for the rest of the round.

I decided to look at how far the 150-yard marker was from the tees. My 150-yard club (in my case an 11-wood) is one of my favorite weapons in the bag.

My score went from 55 from the tips to 46 from the gold tees. But

more important than a better score was the confidence I gained and fun I had when I had an opportunity to reach the green in regulation.

That's important. Golf is meant to reach the green in two or three shots, depending on par-four or parfive, and, with two putts, gives you a par for the course.

During all nine holes, I heard remarks from my sons like "You da woman!"; "Check that woman out for steroids!"; even "Don't let that skirt get in your way."

It didn't matter. I was having success and fun at the same time.

And isn't that why we play this game we sometimes love to hate?

The great Jack Nicklaus is a proponent of Tee It Forward.

"I love the game of golf, but I will be the first to tell you that there are things about our game we need to improve," said Nicklaus in a press release. "Now, The PGA of America and the USGA have come together to develop ways to that can make the game more attractive and more enjoyable. Tee It Forward is the first of many initiatives we have discussed together, and I think families around the country will enjoy alternate formats like this to make the game more fun.

"All of us deeply involved in the game constantly encourage golfers of all skill levels to play the proper tees, but too often golfers want to bite off as much of the golf course as they can. What end up suffering are their scorecard and their overall enjoyment. This program should help stimulate people to play the proper tees and maximize the golf experience."

# Successful fundraiser continues at Willow Springs

The Willow Springs Fundraiser began three years ago for a sad reason. Sydney Gavan, then five years old, had been diagnosed with a rare form of leukemia.

To raise funds, three very dedicated people put together a golf scramble — Casey Gavan, the stricken girl's mother; Willow Springs co-owner Ken Moore; and Frank Gibson, a friend of the family.

Since then, many more people have become involved, and the story has taken a positive turn.

Sydney, now eight, has been in remission for more than a year, in large part because of a successful bone marrow transplant.

But the event at the Vassar/Millington area 18-hole golf course will continue, benefiting other people with serious medical problems.

Ken Moore told Strikes n' Strokes how it all began.

"(Casey and Frank)first came to me with the idea of a golf outing, along with a venue to test for bone marrow donors," he explained.

Moore, along with longtime friend and business partner Larry Warner, has owned and managed Willow Springs for nearly 20 years.

"All it took was a mouth swab and filling out some paperwork for potential donors. And, that first year, we came up with more than 160," recalled Moore.

"This year was really special, too, because it was the first time that Sydney was able to attend."

Casey Gavan is beyond grateful for the heartfelt efforts on behalf of her daughter.

"It has been unreal and truly amazing how it all came together," she said. "Our family appreciates it so much."

The Gavans, Gibson and almost everyone in what has come to be called Team Sydney attended LakeVille High School.

"Nearly all of us are from Columbiaville, Otter Lake or Otisville," said Gibson, who organizes and runs the golf scramble. "Sydney goes to Lapeer schools, so a lot of people from that area have joined up, too."

For its first two years, the event was held in mid-May; however, because of rain, this summer's fundraiser took place in late June.


These days, Sydney's parents are kept busy with many trips to Ann Arbor for their daughter's chemotherapy maintenance treatments.

But since the girl's condition has improved so dramatically, the mission of the fundraiser has expanded.

"Last year, we helped a woman in Davison who had some major medical problems," said Gibson. "The rest of the money went to leukemia research."

Casey Gavan reports that the 2010 proceeds went to the Children's Miracle Network, while

# So far, so good for Greenbrier Golf Course new owners

He golfs; she doesn't. But that didn't worry Caro natives Dwayne and Gloria Hall as they decided to purchase the Greenbrier Golf Course this past spring.

The Halls thus became only the third set of owners at the 18-hole layout in its 40-year history.

It is located south of Mayville on M-24.

"Dwayne had played the course for years," said Gloria, "and offered to pay his membership dues (for 2011) last fall. But they (thenowners Burt and Tim Quinn) didn't think they would be opening in the spring."

Both Halls are retirees from longterm jobs—Dwayne from General Motors, Gloria from Hurley Hospital in Flint — and they began pondering the possibility of buying the course and keeping it open.

According to Gloria, the couple had no intention of going into business. "We went back and forth about it. Should we? Shouldn't we?


"Finally, we just said 'Let's go ahead and see what happens."

For the Halls, the deciding factor was the opportunity to provide local support in a tough economy.

"We've just been in the habit of doing things in the community," said Gloria, who ran the Heritage Hall exhibit at the Tuscola County Fair for about five years in the early 2000s.

"We try to focus on local employment, and we've been very pleased at the support we've gotten. And we've gotten busier as the weather has gotten warmer," she added.

In keeping with their support of

jobs in the community, the Halls opted to keep the course's grounds crew intact.

"And they've done a great job for us," said Dwayne, referring to new landscaping and improvements that the crew has done on the cart paths and tee areas, in addition to keeping the course in good shape.

Another encouraging development: the increased amount of play at Greenbrier by area youth.

"We're glad that the members of the Mayville High School golf team have continued to play here after their season was over," reported Gloria. "We even had some homeschooled kids and some children as young as three and four years old come out this year. And we've started giving a discount to students from other schools in the area so they can work on their game here during the summer," she said.

"Golf is a good, healthy sport for young people."

League participation has held steady this year at the course, and Greenbrier will be hosting a couple of fundraiser outings later this summer.

One will benefit several area residents currently recovering from in-

juries sustained in an auto accident, and the other will help maintain a local scholarship fund.

"We hope to have more (fundraising events) in the future," said the Halls.

In addition, the new owners are reviving the Sunflower Festival 4-Man tournament in late July, in conjunction with the Mayville Sunflower Festival.

"The course hasn't been involved with it (the festival) in quite a few years," said Dwayne.

continue to Tee It Forward whenever possible.

While playing Timber Ridge in East Lansing, we settled on the white tees at 6,010 yards. But we should have gone the forward tees at 5,175.

By moving to the white tees for the four par-fives, we would have increased the yardage to 5,500 yards.

No matter what variation of Tee It Forward you do, it still comes down to shot-making. Once you get to your favorite shot into the green, you still have to get on the green and make the putts.

That's hard enough to do, time after time.

Try Tee It Forward. The pace of your play may speed up, and the game of golf becomes more fun when the numbers on the scorecard go down.
