

The team Carbeno bowls with on the Thursday Cass River Trader men's league is called Boyd's Boys, in honor of the late Evans Boyd, who passed away last year.


And that's appropriate, since Carbeno gives Boyd, a fellow southpaw, a lot of credit for improvement in his game.



Friday afternoon Raymond Jones Senior League.


"It was the first time I had reached the 10th frame with all strikes," he said. "I've had 11 straight three times but each one I started with an open."



Off to warmer pastures

J. Nevelle Kirby was at a crossroads. At one point this past summer; Kirby was looking at going into General Motors. At the time, Kirby was running the Pro Shop inside Galaxy Lanes.

"I would never stop bowling," he said. "I would still be involved in the game, but not necessarily the industry."

But in late July, Kirby's future took a turn for warmer pastures – running the bowling pro shop at Deltona Lanes (Orange City, Fla.) under Bowling-Ball.com

"One of my Facebook friends just happened to be looking somewhere, I 'm not sure what," he said. "But she sent me a message regarding if I had seen an ad regarding a job.

"I hadn't, but I would look into it," he said. "On July 26, after seeing the ad, I immediately sent off my resume." Kirby didn't tell many people about it.

"I didn't want to get anybody in an uproar (about him leaving the area)," he said. "I was willing to let the chips fall where they lay.

"After they received my resume, and I learned that I made it past the first phase," Kirby added. "That's when I let my family know that it potentially could happen."

According to Kirby, they had a few candidates and were talking about flying them down for final interviews.

"They contacted my references and it went from there. We did an interview over the phone," he said. "Because of the references and talking with other people in the industry, my reputation

preceded me and they felt they didn't have to do any more. They were comfortable with me that we didn't have to do the face-to-face interviews."

At that point, Kirby, 39, was planning the move down south.

And, on Sep. 3, Kirby took over the pro shop duties down there.

"Things are going well," he said. "It's not getting used to the job because the job is basically the same as what I was doing up here. It's getting used to the people; how they like to do things and getting myself established with the people in the area."

Kirby said that bowling is a "different animal" in the Florida community.

"There aren't that many high-profile leagues," he said. "There might be bigger prize funds but the daily money, like pots and brackets, aren't there.

"In our center, we have only four sanctioned leagues," he added. "But every night of the week, the center is busy with leagues. It's definitely more laid back here than it is in Michigan."

Kirby only bowls in one league per week right now in the 40-lane house where his pros shop is located.

"It's a far cry from bowling three to five times per week," he said. "Usually, one of those leagues was like practice for me."

Practice?

"Anyone that knows me, knows I don't like to practice," he said. "I've had to resort to that lately. These lanes are one of the toughest scoring centers around here. It's hard to get the corner pins out.

"I started to feel like I am bowling better recently," he added. "I just had my first 300 game here last week.

"Back in Michigan, we used to say wait until the cold weather hits before seeing an increase in scores," he said. "We can't say that here."

"The high school competition is already done," he added. "It (bowling) is considered a fall sport. There is more golfing going on now because it's too hot during the summer.

"The bowling leagues continue throughout the summer because people want to get out of the heat," he added.

"I found out there are three seasons here: hot, hotter and the love bug," he said. "I don't know what they (love bugs) are. I think they are some type of lady bugs.

"I haven't gotten to that season, yet," Kirby laughed.

In the meantime, Kirby has started to make a mark with some of his customers.

"I made a connection with some of the junior bowlers down here," he added. "I've also been working with some of the other bowlers. I'm just trying to make my presence felt."

One of those other bowlers is mid-Michigan native Walter Lang.

"He's one of my customers down here," he said. "He's from Frankenmuth and used to bowl at Candlelite. He moved down here in the early 1990s.

"I do miss my friends and family dearly," Kirby added. "My sister (Tracie Page), Kristy Kerr and Brendan Wheeler won the first half of the Sunday night league (Old School at Stardust)," he said. "When I bowled with them last year, we won that league.

"We also won the Friday Nite Live league (at Candlelite) last year," he added.

"I really miss that. I have been texting with them back and forth giving them a few suggestions along the way. I'm not one to have been away as long as I have been."

Kirby is looking forward to the future his new job may bring.

"I'm still on staff with Storm," he said. "Right now, I don't have a lot to do with the website (bowlingball. com). Hopefully in the next release, I will be able to do a video."

Kirby was hoping to come back for a visit, but the plan fell through.

"The shop has been very busy lately," he said.

"I do miss everybody, (but) I am not disappointed with my move ... I don't live my life with regrets." ♦

Heins learned from the best of the best

Tom Heins started drilling bowling balls in 1965. He hasn't stopped since nor does he have any plans of stopping soon.

The 63-year-old owns Ideal Bowling Equipment at 3666 Bay Road in Saginaw, just north of Olive Garden. Ideal has been there since April 1, 1983.

"Eddie Chmielewski taught me how to work the drill press," Heins said. "It's his fault. I never stopped."

Heins entire life has been centered around bowling, as a mechanic, assistant manager, manager and in the pro shop business.

"I worked at Timbertown and was the day and night manager," he added. "I would rotate one week working in the day and the next week at night. I also drilled some balls with Dave Doak.

"I also have worked with Chuck Moskal, Gene Weslock, Bill Strike and Corky DeGraff," he added. "I've worked with the best of the best."

In 1977, Heins gave up his career in the bowling centers when Moskal asked him to work at his shop in the Bay Plaza on Bay Road.

"We were there until 1983," Heins said. "He was doing both at the same time and needed some help.

"He didn't realize how busy he was going to be there. We had four or five people working there at the time," Heins recalled.

"It was a lot different back then," added Heins.

"We only had to stock up on two or three different balls that were popular," he continued. "The LT 48 was the big name back then. You can't do that today. There are so many choices to choose from. But also, today we can get a quick turnaround from our supplier on an order."

The urethane ball was scary at first to drill.

"They were \$100 balls back then and if you screwed up, that was a \$100 mistake," he added. "But the reactive resin is the biggest change in bowling balls from back then. With the different weight blocks, every ball does something a little bit different."

Heins has been working in a "stand-alone shop" (not inside a bowling center) for the past 35 years.

"That hasn't been a problem," he said. "If I was in the bowling center, I would spend so much time watching people bowl. I wouldn't be able to get all my work done.

"Right now, I work on bowling balls from the time I get here until

they'd like!"

In recent years, Stardust changed its pool room into Bonkers, a redemption center arcade. They moved the pool room to where the Michigan Tap Room is now located. They also added a six-lane VIP Suite.

"Pool is a great activity for our customers," Richards said. "But it takes up a lot of square feet. The capacity is somewhat limited.

"We moved a couple of tables into Aces Sports Bar (also inside Stardust Lanes)," he added. "That way, some of the Suite customers can gravitate toward Aces and play pool." (There is also one table inside of the Suites).

According to Richards, open areas is the trend right now.

"We want our customers to get the feel of what Stardust is all about," Richards said.

"When they come in, they see the game room. As they enter the center, customers can see the lanes to the right and the Tap Room to the left. And, straight ahead is the Suites.

"When they come in, we want them to take in the whole experience of our center.."

Richards, who is one of the managers of Stardust, really wanted to give the Tap Room a Michigan flavor.

"There is a lot of great beer everywhere," he said. "But we feel that Michigan brews the best beer in the country. We have 16 taps just for Michigan craft beer.

"We have a couple of local favorites," he said. "But we change up the others."

If you are not sure that you would enjoy a craft beer, the Michigan Tap Room has the solution.

"We have what we call flights," Richards said. "You can purchase a sample of four different types of craft beer. We want our customers to find out the Michigan beer that they really like"

"It's a good way to try them out." Once the project was finalized, it took about six months to put it together.

"My dad (owner Gary Richards) and Leroy Anderson (another manager) put their hats on with the thinking of this project," Derek Richards said. "But in the end, it was my call."

The Michigan Tap Room opened last New Year's Eve and it has been a success ever since.

"A lot of our bowlers like it," Richards said. "And we also brought in an entirely new clientele for us. And, when we run our corporate events, it has been pretty popular with them." •



couldn't squeeze any more in."

After the end of the 2005-06 season, Nicholson wasn't in a laughing mood.

"I had Atrial Fib (a fluttering of the heart)," he said. "They put me on a blood thinner. Shortly after that, I ending up cutting my ankle, and it healed.

"But one day,] woke up and wasn't



gone on fire, I would have never made it out. "There was a time that if I felt I had

to use the bathroom at 11:30, I needed to start walking to it by 10," Nicholson added. "I even had trouble lifting my leg over the small lip of a shower. If I had a race with a tortoise, it would go right by me."

Nicholson was bound and determined not to let that stop him.

"I fought back," he said. "It seemed like thousands of exercises." he added. "I went from 18 months of exercise and from a walker, then to a cane. My daughter, Heather, is a physical therapist. She came to me three days a week to really help get back.

"(In 2008) I went up to the secretary of this league (Monday Nite 14 at LeFevre's Family Bowl), and told him I wanted to get on a team for the next season," he said. "Here, I was coming into the center with a walker and asking him to find a spot to bowl."

Nicholson found a team and averaged 189 in the Monday Nite 14 League the first year.

"I went from not walking to averaging 185, then 195 and now 205," he said. "That's amazing after what I had gone through."

In early October of this year, Nicholson rolled a 299 game, leaving a ringing 10-pin, in the Friday night Businessmen League, also at Family Bowl.

"I played sports my whole life," he said. "I played basketball in the Navy and world class softball. "So I know what pressure is like. You have to focus and concentrate on what you are doing.

"But my knees were really shaking on that 12th ball," he said.

Then, a little more than one month

"I gave the ball to Tom (Heins) at Ideal and he drilled it perfectly," Rowley said. "I have to give credit to one my teammates, Jim Doak.

"I have known him for two years," he said. "He has been instrumental in helping my average increase 20 pins over the past couple of years.

"Just by knowing him has helped," Rowley added. "He doesn't try to help unless I ask. All the success I have had can be attributed to him and his patience. I don't want to give Jim too many accolades, it might swell up that head of his. But seriously, once he came aboard, he took us from good to great."

It was Dave Treib's second perfecto. When he approached his 10th frame of his third game with all strikes on the sheet, he reflected on the advice he gave his daughter, Shauna, when she had her first 300 game.

"I kept remembering what I told her," Treib said. "Get the first two, take a step back and take a deep breath. Before you get up there, sit back and think about it.

"As I started my approach, I caught a glimpse of a bowler several lanes down out of my eye," he added. "I really concentrated on my mark when I started toward the foul line.

Treib, 47, recalled that his knees were really knocking when he closed out his first 300 game.

"This time, I learned from it, and took a deep breath and didn't rush the shot," he added. "Glen and I have bowled together for 13 years. Our team has changed throughout that time but the one constant has been the two of us." ♦

later, Nicholson was once again in the position of needing just one more strike for a 300.

While bowling in the Monday Nite 14 league, Nicholson struggled in the first game.

"I had four splits in the warm-ups," he said. "Three of them were 4-8-10s. I was wondering what the heck was going on.

"I was wandering all over the place," he said. "In fact, I opened in the 10th frame. So I made a small adjustment."

That small adjustment turned into a huge number - 300.

"It was a fortunate situation," he said. "After missing that chance earlier, I told myself 'let me get the opportunity to get to the 10th frame.'

"What was amazing about this game was to see all 12 balls hit the pocket, with no messengers or late falling pins," he added. "How often do you see that.?

"When it came down to the 10th frame," Nicholson continued.

"I looked around and could see all the bowlers goose necking me (looking to watch him bowl). I just wanted to be smooth."

the time I go home," he added. "It's kind of perfect right now, I'm pretty busy."

This past summer was a different experience for Heins. The Moskal Trophy Shop business moved out in March.

"Summer is a slow time for bowling as it is," Heins said. "But, before, I would at least see people come in for the trophy business. It was pretty slow this past summer."

Heins was an accomplished bowler during his days on the lanes.

He had a high average of 223 and participated in nearly all of the King of the Hill tournaments, and won several of them throughout his career. He also found himself bowling in leagues five nights per week. Heins never had an award

Three strikes later, Nicholson rolled his first perfect game.

"I came back with a 238 game and finished with a 694 series," he said. "Missed my 700 by six pins, not bad with a 156 game.

"It was six or seven days later that I came down from it (the high of throwing a 300 game)," he said.

"I called my twin brother. I said 'hey, you old fart, how many 300 games do you have?' He doesn't have any. But he shot right back at me and asked 'how many 800 series I have?' You see, he had two and I haven't had one yet."
